# 150th Anniversary of the Transcontinental Railroad

The Utah legislature has appropriated 1 million dollars for the upcoming celebration and on August 16, 2018 Union Pacific matched that with a 1 million dollar donation. The celebration is being billed as the "biggest and best party ever held in the state of Utah" and better than the 2002 Winter Olympics in Salt Lake City.

As part of the celebration, the world's large steam engine, Union Pacific No. 4014, otherwise know as "Big Boy" will be part of the celebration. No. 4014 is currently in the Union Pacific Steam Shop in Cheyenne, Wyoming undergoing restoration. It was originally designed to burn coal but is being converted to burn oil. Steam locomotives are classified by their wheel arrangement. The Big Boy locomotives had a 4-8-8-4 wheel arrangement, meaning they have a 4 wheel leading truck, two sets of 8 driving wheels and a 4 wheel trailing truck. Twenty-five Big Boys were built between 1941 and 1944, numbered 4000 to 4024. The Union Pacific was the only railroad that had Big Boy steam locomotives.

UP steam locomotive 844, with a 4-8-4 configuration will also be in Ogden, Utah for the celebration. UP No. 844 stopped in Marysville in October of 2016

lowa, announces a new traveling exhibition in recognition of the 150th anniversary of the completion of the transcontinental railroad. The Race to Promontory: The Transcontinental Railroad and the American West celebrates the "Meeting of the Rails" at Promontory Summit, Utah, on May 10, 1869, through the photographs and stereographs of Andrew Joseph Russell (1830 – 1902) and Alfred A. Hart (1816 – 1908). Drawn exclusively from the Union Pacific Historic Collection, located at the Union Pacific Railroad Museum, these images represent the largest collection in the world of original photographs documenting the construction of the transcontinental railroad between 1866 and 1869.
